Answer **one** of the following questions in the space provided.

Question 1

‘Everyone has some sort of belief about life, fulfilment, happiness, suffering, death and what comes next. So what is the point of having religious beliefs about these life experiences?’

Discuss this statement. Support your argument with the teachings and views from at least one religious tradition you have studied **and** an example of an individual or group from the same religious tradition(s).

OR

Question 2

What happens to religious beliefs when a religious tradition is confronted by the pressure to change? Discuss this question from the perspective of a religious tradition you have studied.

OR

Question 3

Write a **report** on a particular historical challenge faced by a religious tradition you have studied.

Use the following questions to guide your response.

- Who and what was challenged?
- Why did this challenge occur?
- What were the historical, social and religious contexts for this challenge?
- What were the effects of the challenge on the religious tradition?
- What were the effects of the challenge on different groups within the religious tradition?
- What were the various responses of the religious tradition to the challenge?
- What were the effects of these responses on the religious tradition?
- What were the effects of the religious tradition’s responses on the wider society?
- What were the effects of the religious tradition’s responses on its relationship with the wider society?
- What were the effects of the religious tradition’s responses on its relationship with other religious traditions?

Assessment criteria

The examination will address all of the criteria.

All students will be examined against the following criteria.

1. Use of evidence to support arguments and conclusions.
2. Knowledge of core beliefs within one or more religious tradition/s.
3. Understanding of the interplay between religious beliefs and significant life experiences.
4. Analysis of continuity and maintenance of a core religious belief or beliefs within one or more religious traditions.
5. Analysis of the interplay between a tradition's religious beliefs and vision for society in relation to one or more specific issues.
6. Evaluation of the ways one or more religious tradition/s have responded to a significant challenge.
